Its chief solid constituent is called urea and it also contains a large proportion of water--about 1)5 per cent. --and uric acid, coloring matter and salts. The kidneys are two small, bean-shaped organs, about four inches long by 2 inches wide, situated in the small of the back on either side of the spine at the waist line. The urine passes from them to the bladder through two narrow tubes, 12 to 18 inches long, called ureters. The bladder is in the lowest part of the abdomen, at the front of the pelvic cavity and acts as a reservoir for the urine. It has a capacity of about one pint...



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
